

You can also make an offering: via the contactless card reader at the back, online via https://bradfordcathedral.org.uk/get-involved/donate/ or by texting SEED followed by the amount you wish to give (max £20) to 70450 (e.g. text "Seed 15" to give £15). NB texts cost gift value, plus one standard message.
- ❖ Communion please follow the directions of the Stewards when the time comes. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the Eucharistic Minister. For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service.
- ❖ Please be aware that today's service is being livestreamed and will be available online for two weeks. If you do not want to appear on the livestream please speak to one of the stewards who will direct you to a suitable seat.
- Please do not take pictures or videos during the service, and please either switch off your mobile phone or silence the ringer.
- Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church.
- ❖ If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.
- In the event of an emergency, please remain calm and seated. Stewards will direct you out of the Cathedral.

³⁶ "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³⁷ For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. ³⁸ For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, ³⁹ and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. ⁴⁰ Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴¹ Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. ⁴² Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. ⁴³ But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. ⁴⁴ Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.

Today for the second time, we read the wedding banns of Adam Butler and Suzanne Hume.

The season of Advent begins today with our Advent Procession on at 6.00pm.

The choir will be singing and candles will be lit as we celebrate the beginning of the Christian year. The service is truly the start of our special Advent journey, so do come along if you can to share in the experience. Today is the start of the season of Advent. We have once more lit the Star in the Tower, and this year we introduce a light curtain on the State Gate, supported by Bradford BID. You can also explore cribs in the Cathedral, and for those on social media you can see our #FestivePhotoADay on Instagram and follow the #CathedralElf with us and Bradford At Night. You can also see a video for Advent and Christmas, with a message from the Dean, on our website and social media.

During the four Sundays of the Advent Season leading up to Christmas, Christian churches will be illuminated with candles as congregations light their Advent wreaths of evergreen, shaped in a perfect circle to symbolize God's eternity. Advent means "coming," and during the season, Christians prepare for Jesus' coming.

The FLORAL DISPLAYS during Advent are made of greenery instead of flowers. This allows us to recognise that the Christian life isn't all about celebration. It's about hope and faith and the change in the floral displays demonstrates a longing for the greenery to turn to flowers, just as we long for sadness and our hope to turn to joy.

FAIRTRADE We welcome you to browse the Fair Trade stall this morning. We've restocked the Stem Ginger Cookies and Butter Shortbread biscuits, delicious any time of day with a hot drink from our range of Fairtrade coffees and teas. And if you haven't tried Kilombero rice yet, we still have a few sample packs, plus recipes.

A WELCOME EVENING will be held this Tuesday 29 November at 6.30pm in the Deanery.
