

For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service.
- ❖ Please be aware that today's service is being livestreamed and will be available online for two weeks. If you do not want to appear on the livestream, please speak to one of the stewards who will direct you to a suitable seat.
- Please do not take pictures or videos during the service, and please either switch off your mobile phone or silence the ringer.
- Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church.
- ❖ If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.
- In the event of an emergency, please remain calm and seated. Stewards will direct you out of the Cathedral.

# **Gospel Reading**

Read by Revd Paul Booth, Cathedral Chaplain

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, O Lord.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, <sup>2</sup> "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." <sup>3</sup> This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,

make his paths straight."

<sup>4</sup> Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. <sup>5</sup> Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, <sup>6</sup> and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

<sup>7</sup> But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! 

During the four Sundays of the Advent Season leading up to Christmas, Christian churches will be illuminated with candles as congregations light their Advent wreaths of evergreen, shaped in a perfect circle to symbolise God's eternity. Advent means "coming." It is a season of expectation and preparation as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming of Christ. Church decorations are simple and sparse, and purple is the traditional colour used. Advent falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas.

We have once more lit the Star in the Tower, and this year we introduce a light curtain on the State Gate, supported by Bradford BID. You can also explore cribs in the Cathedral, and for those on social media you can see our #FestivePhotoADay on Instagram and follow the #CathedralElf with us and Bradford At Night. You can also see a video for Advent and Christmas, with a message from the Dean, on our website and social media - please visit bradfordcathedral.org.uk/advent-and-christmas

The FLORAL DISPLAYS during Advent are made of greenery instead of flowers. This allows us to recognise that the Christian life isn't all about celebration. It's about hope and faith and the change in the floral displays demonstrates a longing for the greenery to turn to flowers, just as we long for sadness and our hope to turn to joy.

**The Wednesday@One Organ Recital** is at Ipm with Katelyn Emerson (Cambridge). There will be the usual buffet lunch (£4) at 12.30pm and the recital itself is free, but there will be a retiring collection.

MONDAY FELLOWSHIP loin us in the de Lacy Centre at 2pm on Monday December 12th for the annual Christmas Monday Fellowship event. There will be carols with piano accompaniment and seasonal refreshments. Participants are invited to bring Christmas stories, poems and anecdotes to share with the group, if they would like to, but there is no obligation.

**CHILDREN'S SPACE** We are hoping to restart Children's Space soon and are looking for more volunteers to join the team. No experience is necessary, just a desire to help children learn about the Bible. Volunteers will be required to complete an enhanced DBS check. Please speak to Emma Towers or a member of the clergy team if you are interested.

**MINCE PIES** During the Advent and Christmas seasons we will host extra services, when we will welcome many people, some who may have never been into the Cathedral before. One of our key values is Hospitality and at Christmas this extends to mince pies whenever a drink is offered! - and we need mince pies in order to do this. If you are able to donate any we would be really grateful, please hand them in to either the Office or to any of the staff. Thank you.

**CATHEDRAL CHRISTMAS CARDS** This year's design is now available in the Cathedral Shop, alongside other festive gifts. A pack of 10 cards is £6 and cards are also available from the online shop, with additional postage costs for UK delivery.
