- Please be aware that today's service is being livestreamed and will be available online for two weeks. If you do not want to appear on the livestream, please speak to one of the stewards who will direct you to a suitable seat.

Introduction

Dear friends, forty days ago we celebrated the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Now we recall the day on which he was presented in the Temple, when he was offered to the Father and shown to his people. As a sign of his coming among us, his mother was purified, as we now come to him for cleansing. In their old age Simeon and Anna recognized him as their Lord, as we today sing of his glory. In this eucharist, we celebrate both the joy of his coming and his searching judgement, looking back to the day of his birth and forward to the coming days of his passion.

Gospel Reading

Read by Revd Pete Stoodley.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.' ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah.

²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

- ²⁹ 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;
- ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation,
- ³¹ which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eightyfour. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

The Lighting of Candles

During the following hymn, we will light our candles from the Paschal Candle, which will be carried from the Sanctuary to the Font.

Please keep your lit candle upright to avoid any drips.

The Paschal Candle will be followed by the Choir and Clergy. As they process, please turn to face the font.

When candles are lights on Candlemas Day the dark is behind us, and spring's on its way.

For Mary will follow, with tears in her eyes, her Saviour and Son to the foot of the cross.

Great Spirit of Yahweh, with courage inspire your everyday saints who face up to despair.

They pass through temptation, through failure, through death. When darkness descends they plod onwards in faith.

Like Anna, like Simeon, may they have trust, the eyes to see Jesus, and peace at the last.

The candles invite us to praise and to pray when Christmas greets Easter on Candlemas Day.

STAFF UPDATES:

Alex Berry: Study Leave During February and March, Alex Berry will be taking a period of study leave after six years in post as Director of Music. During his time away from Bradford, Alex will be exploring different models of church music-making. This will include looking into singing programmes that link schools with churches here in the UK, and a period of time in the USA learning how church choirs and chorister programmes operate in the Episcopal Church.
