- ❖ Communion please follow the directions of the Stewards when the time comes. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the Eucharistic Minister. For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service.
- Please do not take pictures or videos during the service, and please either switch off your mobile phone or silence the ringer.
- Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church.
- ❖ If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.
- In the event of an emergency, please remain calm and seated. Stewards will direct you out of the Cathedral.

EASTER LILIES: During this season of Lent, there will be no flowers in the nave, but as in previous years there will be an opportunity for anyone who wishes to, to give a lily/lilies in memory of someone on Easter Day. If you would like to do so, please put your name and theirs on the form on the Sound Desk. The cost is £4 per stem. Please put your money into the flower slot in the blue safe in the Shop area, making use of the yellow envelope if you are able to gift aid your donation. Alternatively, email sharon.link@bradfordcathedral.org The flowers and the names of those they are in memory of will be displayed in the cathedral on Easter Sunday and also on our website and social media. Please note that the closing date for requesting lilies is Sunday, March 26.

CONFIRMATION is an opportunity to renew Christian commitment made at Baptism. The next Confirmation service at the Cathedral will be on Sunday, 21 May at 1030. In a service of Confirmation, the bishop reaffirms the baptismal identity of the confirmation candidates by saying 'God has called you by name and made you his own'. They then lay their hands on the head of the candidates and pray the confirmation prayer, 'Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit'.

Confirmation services are also an opportunity to be received into the Church of England from another church in which we have already been baptised and confirmed. If you would like to explore this possibility for yourself, please speak to one of the clergy.
