- Communion please follow the directions of the Stewards when the time comes. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the Eucharistic Minister. For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service.
- Please do not take pictures or videos during the service, and please either switch off your mobile phone or silence the ringer.
- Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church.
- If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.
- In the event of an emergency, please remain calm and seated. Stewards will direct you out of the Cathedral.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews.² He came to lesus by night and said to him, 'Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God.' ³ Jesus answered him, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above.' ⁴ Nicodemus said to him, 'How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?' ⁵ Jesus answered, 'Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit.⁶ What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. ⁷ Do not be astonished that I said to you, "You must be born from above." ⁸ The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' ⁹ Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' ¹⁰ Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

¹¹ 'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. ¹² If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? ¹³ No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. ¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

EASTER LILIES: During this season of Lent, there will be no flowers in the nave, but as in previous years there will be an opportunity for anyone who wishes to, to give a lily/lilies in memory of someone on Easter Day. If you would like to do so, please put your name and theirs on the form on the Sound Desk. The cost is £4 per stem. Please put your money into the flower slot in the blue safe in the Shop area, making use of the yellow envelope if you are able to gift aid your donation. Please note that the closing date for requesting lilies is Sunday, March 26.

CONFIRMATION is an opportunity to renew Christian commitment made at Baptism. The next Confirmation service at the Cathedral will be on Sunday, 21 May at 1030. In a service of Confirmation, the bishop reaffirms the baptismal identity of the confirmation candidates by saying 'God has called you by name and made you his own'. They then lay their hands on the head of the candidates and pray the confirmation prayer, 'Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit'. Confirmation services are also an opportunity to be received into the Church of England from another church in which we have already been baptised and confirmed. If you would like to explore this possibility for yourself, please speak to one of the clergy.
