Others are invited to come forward for a blessing – please indicate this by keeping your hands down. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the Eucharistic Minister. For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. Please follow the directions of the Stewards when the time comes. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service. If you would like to explore baptism, confirmation, or communion before confirmation, please speak to a member of the Clergy after the service.

Bradford Cathedral Choir is directed by Graham Thorpe, Organist and Director of Music. The organ is played by William Campbell, Sub-Organist and Assistant Director of Music.

Please either switch off or silence your phone and do not take pictures or videos during the service – this is not permitted for safeguarding reasons. Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church. If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.

Introduction

Dear friends, forty days ago we celebrated the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Now we recall the day on which he was presented in the Temple, when he was offered to the Father and shown to his people. As a sign of his coming among us, his mother was purified, as we now come to him for cleansing. In their old age Simeon and Anna recognized him as their Lord, as we today sing of his glory. In this eucharist, we celebrate both the joy of his coming and his searching judgement, looking back to the day of his birth and forward to the coming days of his passion.

Gospel Reading

The Revd Pete Gunstone, Minor Canon for Worship and Nurture

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), ²⁴ and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah.

²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

- 31 which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'
- ³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'
- ³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.
- ³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

The Candlemas Procession

The Lighting of Candles

During the following hymn, we will light our candles from the Paschal Candle, which will be carried from the Sanctuary to the Font.

Please keep lighted candles upright to avoid any drips.

The Paschal Candle will be followed by the Clergy. As they process, please follow them to the font, or turn in your place to face the font.

When candles are lighted on Candlemas Day the dark is behind us, and spring's on its way.

A glory dawns in every dark place, the light of Christ, the fullness of grace.

The kings have departed, the shepherds have gone, the child and his parents are left on their own.

They go to the temple, obeying the law, and offer two pigeons, the gift of the poor.

But Anna and Simeon recognise there the Christ-child who came at the turn of the year.

The old who have suffered and waited so long see hope for the world as they welcome the young.

They gaze at God's wonderful answer to prayer, the joy of the Jews and the Gentiles' desire.

The light is increasing and spring's in the air.

Look back with thanksgiving! Look forward with awe!

They see before Mary a heart-piercing grief, but trust is complete at the end of their life.

For Mary will follow, with tears in her eyes, her Saviour and Son to the foot of the cross.

Great Spirit of Yahweh, with courage inspire your everyday saints who face up to despair.

Like Anna, like Simeon, may they have trust, the eyes to see Jesus, and peace at the last.
