

Welcome to Bradford Cathedral

The seat of the Bishop of Leeds and a Centre of Worship and Mission One of three Cathedrals — Bradford, Ripon & Wakefield — in the Anglican Diocese of Leeds

Welcome to Bradford Cathedral, particularly if you are visiting or are with us for the first time. If you are, please do introduce yourself to a Steward or the Clergy.

Large print copies are available at the main door. You are invited to join in the words in **bold type** in this order of service, and to sit or stand as directed as you are able.

During the offertory hymn, a plate will be passed around for offerings. You can also make an offering via the contactless card reader at the back or online via this QR code that will direct you to https://bradfordcathedral.org.uk/get-involved/donate/ where you can either make a one-off donation or set up regular giving.



Communion. Those who are confirmed or are baptised and in the habit of receiving Holy Communion are welcome to do so. Others are invited to come forward for a blessing – please indicate this by keeping your hands down. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer, please indicate this to the Eucharistic Minister. For health reasons, we do not permit intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), but you are welcome to receive only the bread if you prefer. Please follow the directions of the Stewards when the time comes. If you wish to receive communion in your seat, please speak with one of the stewards at the main door before the start of the service. If you would like to explore baptism, confirmation, or communion before confirmation, please speak to a member of the Clergy after the service.

Prayer for Healing optionally including the Laying on of Hands and/or Anointing with Oil will be available during Communion at the High Altar and Prayer Ministry will be available in the side chapels. Having received communion or a blessing, please make your way to the Sanctuary and a steward will direct you.

Bradford Cathedral Choir is directed by Graham Thorpe, Organist and Director of Music. The organ is played by William Campbell, Sub-Organist and Assistant Director of Music.

Please either switch off or silence your phone and do not take pictures or videos during the service – this is not permitted for safeguarding reasons. Lavatories, including disabled facilities, are available towards the back of church. If you use a hearing aid, please turn it to the T position.

In the event of an emergency, please remain calm and seated. Stewards will direct you out of the Cathedral. If you have any concerns, please speak to a Churchwarden or member of the Clergy.

⁵Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that 'the person who does these things will live by them.' ⁶But the righteousness that comes from faith says, 'Do not say in your heart, "Who will ascend into heaven?" '(that is, to bring Christ down) ⁷'or "Who will descend into the abyss?" '(that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). ⁸But what does it say?

It is right to give you thanks in sickness and in health, in suffering and in joy, through Christ our Saviour and Redeemer, who as the Good Samaritan tends the wounds of body and spirit. He stands by us and pours out for our healing the oil of consolation and the wine of renewed hope, turning the darkness of our pain into the dawning light of his kingdom.

And now we join with saints and angels for ever praising you and singing:

The Laying On of Hands and Anointing with Oil will be available at the High Altar rail. Prayer Ministry will be available in the side chapels (praying in confidence with two members of the Prayer Ministry Team).

The Laying on of Hands is administered using these or other suitable words
